AER Youth Regional Network's action plan


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The Assembly of European Regions Youth Regional Network

Created by the Assembly of European Regions in 2008, the Youth Regional Network (YRN) is a cross-regional youth platform, promoting active youth participation at regional level. Composed of regional-level youth councils, parliaments and organizations in AER's network and membership, it provides young people with an opportunity to express policy recommendations, to foster debate and capacity-building, to exchange good practices, to reach out to decision-makers and to influence policies. The YRN is a unique forum for young people from diverse regions to raise their voice collectively, while introducing a European dimension to youth policy in those regions.

The YRN action plan

Voicing the opinion of European youth is a great and complex task, especially considering the immense diversity of our regions and the youths living there. Yet, youth face many similar opportunities and issues. The action plan is written with the purpose of mapping areas and topics in the society that affect and engage young people and means by which the Youth Regional Network can address and work with these topics.

Providing guidance first and foremost for youths politically involved in their communities, to aid a better, more successful and meaningful youth participation.

1. Concrete actions

- Collecting and sharing general information on opportunities to apply for funding and drafts.
- Create a system to gather and distribute information about events and resources in the different regions to facilitate interregional participation, collaboration and exchange of best practices.
 - To gather the information: In the form of a standardized survey.
 - To distribute the information: Newsletter to members, SoMe.
- Organize educational webinars on activism and civic participation with relevant hosts and with an European perspective

2. Long term vision

Bring governments and youth from different regions together to exchange best practices and discuss the topic of youth participation.

2. Concrete action

- Reach out to the organizing committee of the next Summer Academy to implement a workshop or debate on youth participation, focusing on the dialogue between



elected officials and youth, with a showcase of the Norwegian model of youth participation.

- Suggest making it mandatory that the governments bring youth representatives in the next Summer Academy.

3. Long term vision

Ensure the visibility of YRN and their work and achievements for the regions and governments.

3. Concrete actions

- Creating a newsletter showing achievements to be distributed tomember regions.

4. Long term vision

Facilitate the networking and the exchange of best practices revolving around youth participation in Europe. Create common solutions to be tailored in each of the regions.

4. Concrete actions

- Map the barriers faced by European youth in their youth participation.
 - Organize focus groups.
 - Collect information through a form to be filled by the members.
- On the quantitative level, research must be done on the topic in order to determine the overarching directions under youth participation which are to be addressed through the mapping process.
- Make use of the Erasmus+ and the European Solidarity Corps programmes to gather YRN member organizations representatives. Both as means of creating the space to exchange good practices, but also to get involved in designing and implementing workshops on youth participation for the local community where the gatherings are happening

5. Long term vision

- Encourage the facilitation of good and meaningful youth participation in European regions and encourage member regions to support their YRN delegates financially when attending events.



5. Concrete actions

- Write a statement to the AER highlighting the importance of youth participation with a strong encouragement for regions to support their members.
- Work towards a raise of the YRN budget line.
